Hello Team:

I hope you are all enjoying this beautiful summer! As I write this I am looking forward to this weekend when I will have the honor of judging at the Stone Soup Showdown at the Orleans County Fair. This event is part of our Stone Soup Success program that we jointly run with Cornell Cooperative Extension. It will be similar to some of the food tv shows where contestants are presented a box of food items and they have a specific amount of time to make creative dishes. The ingredients will be similar to what you might find in our Pop-up Pantry Food distributions. I hope you all had an opportunity to visit the fair. They do a wonderful job!

In July the House Labor-HHS Appropriations subcommittee marked up the 2024 appropriations bill. A number of human service programs were proposed to be eliminated and several have proposed funding cuts. Fortunately, the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) was not designated for cuts in the bill. This is good news but since many other cuts were proposed, it is likely that interest groups may call attention to this so it is important that we continue to do our part to show the good work we do with CSBG funding, and more importantly, the outcomes. As a refresher, CSBG is the foundational funding that makes us a Community Action Agency. Each year our Director team makes a budget and workplan for CSBG. This includes ALL of our programs, no matter what the funding source. Then quarterly, we report out on our progress toward our goals. Opponents to CSBG often make statements about us not making an impact in the War on Poverty. Tracking OUTCOMES is our defense to these statements. All the services in the world don't make a difference if we do not achieve our goal of helping people to become self-sufficient and if we don't track this, we can't take credit for the work. We are required to follow ROMA (Results Oriented Management and Accountability) in all that we do. When we report to the state, we not only include numbers on services, but also outcomes, called NPIs or National Performance Indicators. Here is an example of Services and NPIs related to Employment.

As you can see, outcomes often require some type of follow-up with the customer to see how they are doing with achieving goals. An example would be checking in with a customer in 90 days to see if they are still employed after working with us on finding employment. Tracking these outcomes gives us the data we need to demonstrate that we are truly making a difference in the War on Poverty and knowing you were able to help someone achieve their goals is one of the most rewarding parts of being part of this agency. 
Family information is required. In order to keep the distribution coming to our community we have to report on those served.
